

MEET CHEF CHAIM BORNSTEIN



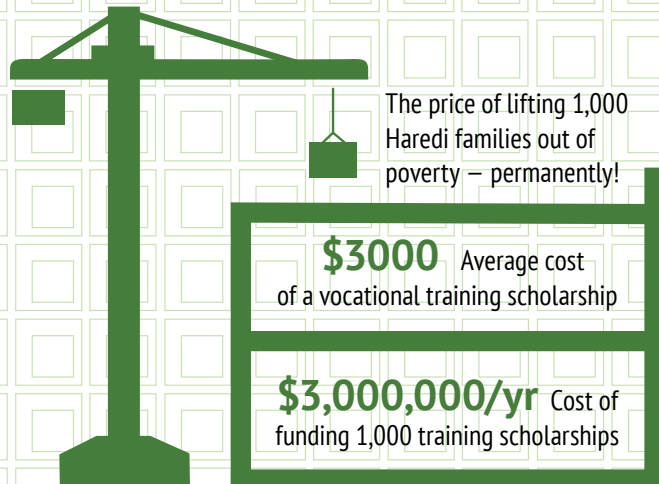
29 years old, married with 3 children

During 2020, we need to fund 1,000 vocational scholarships – 750 for men and 250 for women.

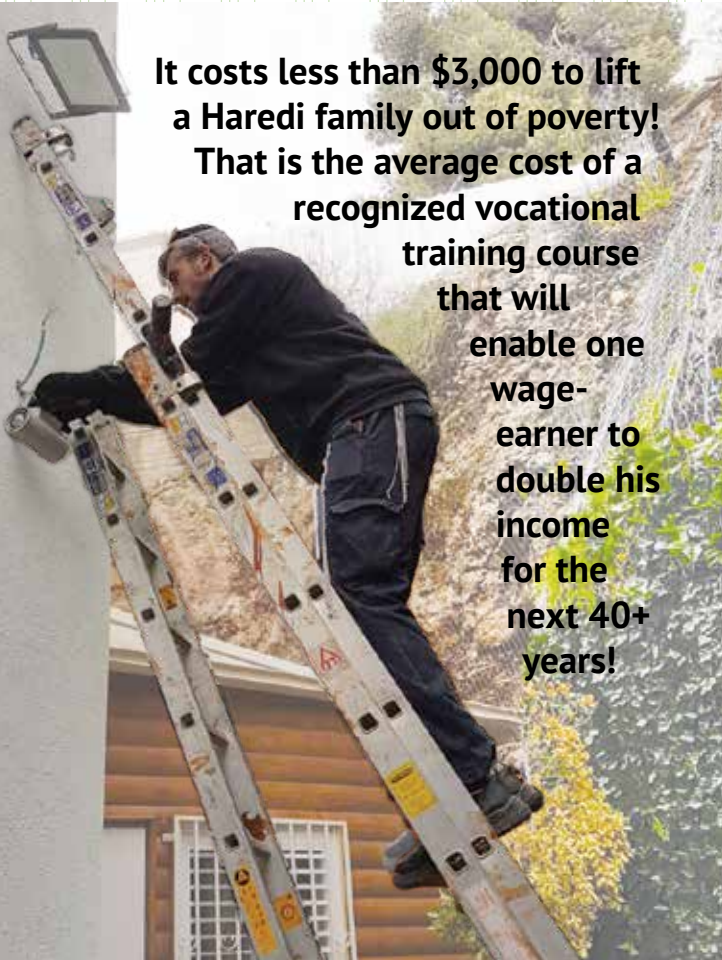
Lifting Families Out of Poverty

LIFTING FAMILIES OUT OF POVERTY

In recent years there has been an acute shortage of funding for Haredi vocational training courses. Many people from both the Litvish and the Chassidic communities prefer not to study college or university level academic subjects, and often lack the basic skills to find well-paid jobs.

Since they tend to marry and start families at a young age, they often have little choice but to take poorly paid jobs rather than learning a trade, since they cannot afford to stop working in order to study. This reality limits their long-term economic prospects and, as their families grow, they get caught in the poverty trap, often becoming dependent on charity donations to make ends meet.

It costs less than \$3,000 to lift a Haredi family out of poverty! That is the average cost of a recognized vocational training course that will enable one wage-earner to double his income for the next 40+ years!



TEACH ME A TRADE!

KEMACH recommends and funds many meaningful vocational training courses, of which these are a representative sample:

COMPUTER PROGRAMMING

1 year course, 10 hours/week. 10,000 NIS scholarship toward 25,000 NIS course.



CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT

9 month course, 10 hours/week. 4,500 NIS scholarship toward 6,500 NIS course.



CYBER SECURITY

250 classroom hours plus 150 supervised work experience (2 days/week). 7,000 NIS scholarship toward 17,000 NIS subsidized course in Tzfat.



ARCHITECTURE & INTERIOR DESIGN

3-year course for women, 8,500 NIS scholarship toward 23,000 NIS course.



LAND SURVEYING USING DRONES

235 hour course leading to recognized qualification. 8,000 NIS scholarship toward 11,000 NIS course.
